

Gifts Inventory: Helping Youth Find Their Place

Everyone has a gift. A gift does not mean expertise.

- 1. Gifts of the Hand (feet and voice) = abilities/skills you can offer to others
- 2. Gifts of the Head = knowledge and the ability to be curious
- Curiosity is a connector. It also opens doors to new experiences.
- Chatting, the ability to carry a conversation can connect
- 3. Gifts of the Heart = rewards of relationships
- interests and passions shared with others
- hospitality towards others

Talking with youth about their gifts and sharing their gifts with others, helps them feel seen, heard, and valued.

Help youth identify their gifts and then connect how to contribute them to others.

A gift is not a gift until it's given away.
