PY 2024-2025 Community Needs Assessment Supports to Encourage Low-Income Families

Overview

Butler County is located in southwestern Ohio and is bordered by Montgomery County and Preble County to the north, Warren County to the east, Hamilton County to the south, and Franklin and Union counties, Indiana, to the west. The county seat, Hamilton, is approximately 30 miles north of Cincinnati and 38 miles south of Dayton. Butler County was formed in 1803 and has six cities (Fairfield, Hamilton, Middletown, Monroe, Trenton and Oxford), six villages and 13 townships.

Served by rail lines, interstate highways, and two nearby international airports, Butler County continues to attract businesses, though many of those jobs are lower-paying service sector positions (food service and hospitality). According to the Cincinnati USA Regional Chamber's 2023 State of the Region, jobs in the Cincinnati Region increased to a total of 1.16 million in 2022, which is a 2.19% growth from 2017. From 2013 to 2019, the average annual increase for jobs in the region was 1.57%; however, the increases from 2020 to 2021 and from 2021 to 2022 were higher at 2.69% and 2.29% respectively.

With many jobs in the food service sector, the average wage of servers in the Cincinnati area is \$17.75 an hour, according to Indeed. This is well below the \$30.66 hourly wage for an adult and two children to be self-sufficient, according to the 2023 Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies (OACAA) Self-sufficiency Calculator.

In 2021, Ohio's poverty rate increased for the first time in over a decade from 12.7% to 13.4%, according to the *2023 State of Poverty in Ohio Report*, published by the Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies. The report reflects on chronic versus episodic poverty and states, "Many households are one major expense, one unexpected job loss, or one crisis moment from experiencing poverty. The COVID-19 pandemic showed us how a single unforeseen event can have crippling effects on families." Additionally, many of the programs implemented during the pandemic to help families are now ending, which "may create financial instabilities for households that have relied upon those programs."

Population and Demographics

Butler County had a population of 390,357 in 2020, according to the 2021 Edition of Ohio County Profiles (Ohio Department of Development). The county's projected population will grow to more than 400,000 by 2030, the third highest county by absolute change from 2010 - 2030.

Butler County's population grew by 6.04% from 2010-2020, increasing from 368,130 persons in 2010 to 390,357 persons in 2020. The entire state of Ohio only grew by 2.3% during the same period.

Butler County is the seventh most populous of Ohio's 88 counties and the second most populous of the Tri-state Area (Southwest Ohio/Southeast Indiana/Northern Kentucky). The County is among the top

six percent of all U.S. counties in terms of total population. The county is a mix of rural, suburban, and older urban areas with significant numbers of Appalachians.

African-Americans make up 8% of the county population while Hispanics comprise 4.7% of the population, according to 2021 data.

Poverty Statistics

The U.S. Census Bureau puts Butler County at an 11.6% poverty rate in 2021, which is a 4.5% increase from 2000. A total of 43,595 persons live below the poverty level in the report area. The two largest cities – Hamilton and Middletown – have poverty rates of 16.4% and 20.4%, respectively.

Some 26.3% of Butler County households have income of up to 200% of the federal poverty level. SELF serves families up to 200% for many of its programs with funding from sources other than CSBG.

Of the Butler County households in poverty, single women with children have a 30.1% poverty rate compared to married couples with children who have a 4.4% poverty rate.

African Americans had a 2021 poverty rate of 15.2%, non-Hispanic Whites had a poverty rate of 9.3%, and the Hispanic/Latino poverty rate was 23.1%.

The above statistics, however, do not account for episodic poverty, which has occurred for many county residents during the pandemic.

Compared to the state and nation, Butler County has a lower percentage of residents in poverty, but the upward trend is similar. Poverty is a persistent problem in Butler County and a growing problem in the Cincinnati Metropolitian Statistical Area.

On Dec. 4, 2019, the Center for Community Solutions reported: "Throughout the state, if you live in a poor area, you are likely to live a shorter life than those who live in wealthier areas. Similarly, if you live in an area with a high percentage of Black residents, your life expectancy will be lower than that of counterparts living in majority white areas. These correlations are statistically significant, but do not prove causation."

According to the Center for Community Solutions, the life expectancy in Butler County, Ohio, ranges from about 66 years in some urbanized areas of Hamilton and Middletown to 85-plus years for other areas.

The National Community Action Partnership office produced the following data and charts on poverty, income, housing and related areas for Butler County, Ohio based on Census data.


Population Change






Median Age by Tract, ACS 2015-19










Race Demographics








Veterans, Age and Gender Demographics


Veterans, Percent of Total Population by Tract, ACS 2015-19










Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19


















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Married Family Households Living Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19


Family Poverty Rate by Family Type






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Single Parent Family Households Living Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19







Population Below the Poverty Level, Children (Age 0-4), Percent by State, **SAIPE 2019**










Child Poverty Rate (ACS) Ages 0-17






Population Below the Poverty Level, Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19









Population Below the Poverty Level, Children (Age 0-4), Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19






Child Poverty Rate (ACS) Ages 5-17



Population Below the Poverty Level, Senior (Age 65+), Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19











Unemployment, Rate by County, BLS 2021 - August







Average Work Commute Time (Minutes), Average by Tract, ACS 2015-19
















Enrollment in School, Children (Age 3-4), Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19







No High School Diploma, Veterans, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19






Housing Constructed Before 1960, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19










Evictions






Evictions, Rate per 100 Rental Homes by County, Eviction Lab 2016








Students Eligible for Free or Reduced-Price Lunch, NCES CCD 2018-19







Households Receiving SNAP Benefits, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19
















Asthma Prevalence




Adults Ever Diagnosed with Asthma, Percentage by Race / Ethnicity







A national organization called Prosperity Now reports in 2021, 29% of all Ohio households are liquidasset poor, meaning they lack savings to make ends meet for three months at the poverty level if their income is interrupted. In Butler County, the liquid asset poverty rate, while slightly better, is 25% of the total population.

These numbers underscore that despite improved unemployment rates compared with the middle of the pandemic shutdown, economic recovery is uneven for low-income households.

Community Needs Assessment

SELF's Community Needs Assessment is based upon the previous demographic and other data – the quantitative -- and the following client focus group and surveys – the qualitative. The combination of the two is a more definitive way for SELF to determine its programming foci.

October 2023 Client Survey

A total of 331 clients, who have received assistance or attended a class, responded to a survey request to answer questions about the service they received from SELF and the needs of their household.

When asked what the greatest needs are in their household, the top three answers were: utility payment assistance (25.68%), rent payment assistance (19.94%), and food (10.27%). Having an affordable personal vehicle or personal vehicle repair (7.85%), having housing that is affordable (7.85%), and getting a job/better employment (6.04%) were the next three highest responses.

Collaborative Client Survey – October/November 2021

In September 2021, SELF joined with several other government and nonprofit entities to produce an extensive survey of 44 questions for low-income individuals referred by many different organizations.

The key engaged group that produced the survey included SELF, the Butler County Educational Service Center (BCESC), which operates Head Start and Early Head Start in Butler and Preble Counties, BCESC Success Program and the Family and Children First Council, the public health departments in Middletown, Hamilton and Butler County, the Butler County Department of Job and Family Services, and Miami University.

A total of 586 surveys were completed by low-income individuals. The highlights are listed below (not in priority order):

- When asked why furthering your education is a problem, the top responses were: lack of finances, lack of time, and lack of childcare.
- 8.39% of respondents said they have been unemployed for more than six months.
- When asked if you could improve your employment status what would you focus on, the top three responses were: better pay, no changes needed, and better benefits. That was followed by

flexible working hours.

- When asked about barriers to employment, the top responses following "no barriers" were: lack of childcare/cost of childcare, transportation, and physical health limitations.
- More than 20% of respondents stated that they can't find affordable, quality housing to meet their family's needs.
- Nearly 18% of respondents spend more than 30% of their monthly income on rent/mortgage.
- Nearly 21% of respondents said they have moved at least once during the past year.
- When asked about the barriers to owning a home, the top three barriers were: no down payment, low credit score, and not enough education on how to purchase a home.
- About 12% of respondents with housing problems reported a lack of home repair. That was followed by unsafe neighborhoods and landlord neglect.
- For respondents who reported that managing money is a problem, the top reasons were: need help budgeting, too much debt and lack of cash assistance. About 6% reported that they had too many cash advance/payday loans.
- Of respondents answering the question of why transportation is a problem, the top reasons were: cost of buying a car, cost of gasoline, cost of maintaining a car, and lack of a valid license.
- Cost is the number one barrier for accessing health care.
- When asked to select the top three important factors for a healthy community, respondents answered (in descending order): access to health care, clean environment, and affordable housing.

Client Focus Group July 12, 2023

A low-income individual focus group was held at Crawford Woods Park in Hamilton, Ohio on Wednesday, July 12, 2023. Three individuals and four staff were present. The group discussed SELF's new Auto Repair and Money Management programs, their motivations in life, recruiting for programs, and what is needed in the community and how SELF can help with those needs.

When discussing our new programs, both Auto Repair and Money Management were very well received. Clients feel that the Money Management class is a good idea and is needed in the community. The one-on-one sessions offered with Money Management are beneficial as well.

Money is the major motivator the group discussed. They mentioned that a lack of money keeps them from doing anything. They also brought up the potential to earn gift cards by attending classes.

Recruiting and making people aware of all SELF offers was another discussion during this meeting. The group suggested forming more partnerships with different agencies in the area and trying to reach new clients through advertisements and targeted internet advertising.

Other Assessments

The Butler County Educational Service Center Head Start/Early Head Start 2022 Community Assessment summarized its significant findings and those are outlined below. (It should be noted that the BCESC operates Head Start in neighboring Preble County.) SELF was part of the study planning committee. The report was produced by The Doris Bergen Center for Human Development, Learning & Technology at Miami University.

A review of the data overall reflects continuing concerns (e.g., mental health, access to childcare) as well as positive trends occurring within the two (Butler and Preble) counties. The report findings also reflect issues about the Butler County communities that have either improved, maintained, or declined over several years: since the last community needs assessment was conducted for this area.

Below is highlighted key concerns and positive attributes gleaned from the report.

Concerns/Challenges:

• Almost half of students living in Butler County receive free/reduced lunches, despite data projections of improved food insecurity.

• The number of households enrolled in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) have increased annually since 2018. o As of December 2021, Butler County has 18,836 households enrolled in the SNAP, serving 41,018 individuals, of which 19,486 are children.

• Butler County has also experienced a decrease in the number of certified/licensed available childcare providers in the past few years. o This shortage may impact parental employment/career opportunities in the future, should the need for affordable and quality childcare rise higher than the fewer resources that are currently available, compared to the past few years.

Positive Attributes:

- The level of Bachelor's degrees or higher was higher in Butler County (31.3%) compared to the state of Ohio (28.9%).
- Data from 2015-2019 compares Butler County to the state of Ohio in different performance categories. Home ownership is slightly higher in Butler County (68.1%) when compared to Ohio (66.1%).
- Butler County has a higher percentage of homes with a computer and internet connection (92.1% and 86.8%), compared to Ohio (89.1% and 82% respectively).
- The median household income was higher in Butler County compared to the state. Butler County had an income of \$66,117, while Ohio had an income of \$56,602.
- Butler County had lower poverty rates (10.1%) compared to Ohio (12.6%).
- Food insecurity in Butler County seems to have improved between the 2019 data and the 2021 projections (e.g., 2019 food insecurity rates were 11.8% in Butler County and; compared to 2021 projections of 5.4% in Butler)
- In Butler County, data from 2018, 2019 and 2020 indicate a decrease in the percentage of children below the age of 18 living in poverty.

Other Assessments

SELF also utilized the Butler County Community Health Assessment (CHA) and its 2017 survey analysis (this is the most recent published report as of October 2023) which had 1,647 respondents. Through an extensive process of planning and building community partnerships, new and existing data on multiple health status indicators were collected and analyzed by the CHA Advisory Committee. The Advisory Committee included 43 community representatives from local government, hospital systems, medical and dental clinics, emergency management, law enforcement, education, non-profit organizations, churches, boards of health, governmental and non-governmental agencies targeting vulnerable populations (including children, the elderly, low-income, those with disabilities, those with mental health needs, those with addiction and recovery service needs), and concerned citizens.

Survey respondents were asked to choose among 20 factors the three that were believed to be the most important for a healthy community. The most common choices were low crime/safe neighborhoods as the #1 most important factor, good schools as the second most important, and a good place to raise children as the third. The next highest response choices, among all respondents, were a strong economy, healthy behaviors and lifestyles, meaningful employment, and access to healthcare. Other relevant responses in the survey were:

- 57.3 percent stated that unemployment is "somewhat a problem" up to "a serious problem."
- 54.4 percent stated that one-parent families are "somewhat a problem" up to "a serious problem." The survey does not define why respondents think one-parent families are a problem.
- 51.2 percent stated that vacant buildings are "somewhat a problem" up to "a serious problem."
- 51.6 percent stated that access to transportation is "somewhat a problem" up to "a serious problem."
- 46.3 percent stated that elderly remaining safely in their own homes is "somewhat a problem" up to "a serious problem."

The Butler County Community Health Assessment 2023 Community Survey provided many valuable statistics:

- 64.2% of City of Hamilton residents and 53% of City of Middletown residents stated that their financial health is Fair/Poor.
- 40.9% of City of Middletown residents and 35.8% of City of Hamilton residents feel stressed about meeting their basic needs and the needs of the youth in their families.
- 21.6% of City of Hamilton residents and 21.1% of City of Middletown residents say there are not jobs that meet their needs (when considering living wages, benefits, commute, etc).
- 10.9% of City of Hamilton residents and 7.4% of City of Middletown residents cannot apply to the jobs they want (when considering internet access, criminal record, change in public assistance, etc).

When residents were asked what bills they had been unable to pay in the last year, they provided the following responses:

• 19.2% of City of Hamilton residents and 14.8% of City of Middletown residents were unable to pay for utilities.

- 17.3% of City of Hamilton residents and 13.3% of City of Middletown residents were unable to pay rent or mortgages.
- 14.4% of City of Hamilton residents and 13.3% of City of Middletown residents were unable to pay for transportation (vehicle loan payments, vehicle repairs, gas, etc).

Other Assessments

DeAnna Shores, Middletown's Health Improvement Team Project Coordinator, conducted interviews with more than 100 Middletown residents in November 2022 to discover the issues people in the community are facing. When asked about the things they would like to have access to, residents responded that a place to pay their bills and a sense of community where everyone helps each other are both important issues. When asked what worries them, residents mentioned financial concerns over paying their bills and their minds racing trying to solve problems for themselves and those they love were issues of concern.

Key Informant Interviews

On November 3, 2021, President/CEO of the Greater Hamilton Chamber of Commerce Dan Bates was interviewed, representing the **private sector**. Four key questions were asked of Mr. Bates. Following is a paraphrased summary of that interview.

What do you believe is the greatest need in the Hamilton area? Why?

While it is intangible – the feeling of empowerment -- a feeling that as an individual you really can succeed and achieve your dreams and that Hamilton has everything you need to be successful. Those not part of the movement feel they will be left behind even though the city is moving forward.

What do you believe is the greatest need for low-income families in Hamilton? Why?

Communication and awareness of resources and assistance in connecting to those resources. Still a disconnect between the resources, probably readily available, within nonprofit organizations. There exists a silo between the business community and the larger community support between nonprofits and the broader community. Time to challenge other financial institutions to invest in neighborhoods. What would happen for instance the city of Hamilton working with residents have plan for east end and then the investments. Collective impact. Don't see that here. So many silos (business, nonprofits, city). What if we all sat down at the table and agreed to make change here.

What is the greatest need for entrepreneurs and small business owners? Why?

Relationships. Key relationships that support their goals and objectives. Critical for entrepreneurs to pull together an advisory team with connections they don't have. Developing the relationships you need to be successful. No better way than through the chamber of commerce. Entrepreneurs not likely to ask questions because they may be looked down upon. Lack of confidence keeps them from being as successful as they could be. Perception is other – the perception that business people aren't accessible – not true. Having education, financial resources, having great ideas are all keys to success but never going to maximize that without the relationships. Financial institutions – think "no" is final, but it may be the wrong person you're talking with. They need to get connected to the right person.

In what ways can SELF better support lower income entrepreneurs?

Goes back to helping them. Fear of success. Graduate from the program. Become a part of the larger business community as soon as possible. New entrepreneurs often have a fear of failure. Gap between early entrepreneur in our client base and how to better connect and streamline them into the mainstream business machine. Teaching networking is beyond critical – move from where they are and where they want to be. How do I learn to develop the relationships with the people who will take me to places we want to go without being predatory? Comfort of bringing them as a group to chamber networking event. Detox after those events – what did you think? What are the challenges? Empowering people, breaking down silos and building the relationships you need to be successful.

On December 2, 2021, Pastor Aaron Simpson of the Freedom House Ministries, Hamilton, was interviewed, representing the <u>faith-based sector</u>. Following is a paraphrased summary of that interview.

What do you believe is the greatest need in the Hamilton area? Why?

Cooperation and singleness of vision and purpose. Lots of agencies, churches and government in the same space working in silos. Things get missed. Sense of community identity. Expanding development in Hamilton across the board not just in downtown.

What do you believe is the greatest need for low-income families in Hamilton? Why? Consistent, patient care and accessibility to those equipped and willing to come along side with them, not hand holding. The longer we can walk with low-income families on that spectrum, the better.

What can SELF do better to serve low-income individuals and families? Listening and knowing low-income families beyond their obvious issues.

What can SELF do to partner more with the faith community?

Intentionally communicate with faith leaders and ask them what they see. Ask them how we can serve who they are serving. Pastors know people and have a typically close relationship level. Ask they how we can serve them better. Recognize the importance of relationships in what we are seeing. Bring people to the same table. We are serving the same people, why not partner together?

Summary of Needs Assessment

Based on data collected across community needs assessments, SELF is addressing the following big issues affecting Butler County's low-income population: home repairs/housing, unemployment, underemployment, lack of transportation, lack of educational attainment and lack of assets (home ownership, education, business) with which to sustain themselves during times of economic upheaval.

Housing

According to the US Census, the median age of housing stock in Butler County is 44 years. Older housing often indicates a greater need for home repairs and inefficient heating and appliances.

The aging structures strongly correlate with the urban areas of the county where homeowners (and landlords) struggle to maintain properties. The City of Middletown's Community Revitalization Department finds that the city has 490 properties with 1,942 serious property code violations. These violations encompass minor maintenance tasks such as repairs to steps, sidewalks, driveways, fences, and/or exterior painting. Many of the homes face Code 3 violations, requiring more extensive repairs such as replacing windows, doors, roofs, porches or even rebuilding sections of home foundations.

While the City of Hamilton's Health Department does not track property code violations, it has been estimated that nearly 1,500 homes in Hamilton have building code violations.

In Ohio, twice as many low-income Ohio households had fallen behind on rent payments in January 2021 as had in April 2020. In Butler County, 45.4% of all renters were cost burdened in 2021, according to the *2023 State of Poverty in Ohio Report*, issued by the Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies.

The US Census reports that Butler County, Ohio has an eviction rate per 1,000 renter households of 10.4%, more than the state average of about 6.2%.

Unemployment/Underemployment/Self-employment

The unemployment rate in Butler County in August 2023 (not seasonally adjusted) was 3.5% (Ohio Department of Job & Family Services). However, these rates do not consider those individuals who have exhausted their unemployment benefits, individuals who want to re-enter the workforce, or individuals who have given up looking for employment and certainly do not account for the type of employment (lower wage service sector) obtained.

Underemployment is an equally significant problem evidenced by the majority of the families served by SELF that are the "working poor," eligible for services despite having <u>only</u> earned income (not receiving cash assistance/welfare).

The 2023 Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies Self-sufficiency calculator states that an hourly wage of \$30.66 is needed for an adult and two kids to be self-sufficient, significantly more than most employers offer at the starting level.

Self-employment is another viable option for the county's low-income workforce. According to the Small Business Administration, small businesses accounted for 66% of net new job creation from 1996 to 2021. According to the Census Bureau 2018 County Business Patterns Survey, a majority of all U.S. businesses—54%—employ fewer than five employees. About 33% of small businesses are started with less than \$5,000.

A May 2017 report (most recent available) from the Aspen Institute found that 35% of microenterprise and small business survey respondents reported higher household income in 2015 than at the time they entered the micro or small business program. Median household income increased by 28 percent and average (mean) household income increased by 22%. Forty-seven percent of 828 business owners balanced operating their business with working at another job in 2015. Among the 380 business owners that reported the frequency they worked at another job, 54% worked full time.

Lack of Transportation

Despite the county having a public transportation system, the location of routes, times of service and connectivity with neighboring transit systems is limited.

Transportation is a difficult need to meet. SELF offers limited transportation to clients enrolled in some of its programs and participates as an active member of the board of directors of the Transit Alliance of Butler County which continues to build a broader solution to this widespread problem. SELF offers employment transportation to clients during those times and to those locations when the public transportation system is unavailable.

2023 State of Poverty Report:

"Lower-income families are less able to afford the costs of owning and maintaining one or more vehicles, and factors such as urban sprawl and lack of affordable housing can push those families into areas far removed from employment opportunities and economic centers. Given that a quarter of Ohioans work outside their county of residence, a significant number of low-income families may be far removed from work centers."

"For low-income families, buying and maintaining a personal vehicle can be a challenge. Average usedcar prices in Ohio are the third highest in the entire nation."

"The lowest tenth of households (in terms of income) on average own one vehicle, versus 1.8 per household in the middle tenth and 2.8 per household in the highest tenth. As such, when a problem occurs with a vehicle, it affects families in poverty more than those in good financial standing." "Recent data shows that the average repair time on a vehicle is 12 days, two days longer than the repair time in 2020. That means that a low-income family might lose their only means of transportation for nearly two weeks, keeping them from getting to their job, childcare provider, or grocery store for an extended period of time."

Lack of Educational Attainment and Stable Assets

Three major causes of or correlations to household economic instability are: a failure to build assets through a sustained savings program; inadequate means of generating income because of a lack of marketable skills or an inability to establish viable self-employment; and a lack of equity-generating homeownership. Both nationally and locally, there is a great need for programs that address these problems and help citizens become more economically self-sufficient.

The 2023 State of Poverty in Ohio report, issued by the Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies, clearly demonstrates the link between educational attainment and poverty. Statewide, people are more likely to live in poverty if they have not finished high school. The likelihood that they will live in poverty declines as they receive additional education; those having a bachelor's degree have the lowest level of poverty.

The American Community Survey found that 8.5% of the total Butler County population over the age of 25 does not have a a minimum of a high school diploma.

How SELF Meets the Needs of Butler County's Low-Income Residents

Based on continuing needs identified by clients, Census data and other assessments, SELF works with residents who are unemployed, underemployed, interested in additional education, building assets and/or maintaining their greatest asset, their home. To meet those needs, SELF will continue to offer the following programs/services:

<u>Emergency Rent and Utility Assistance</u> (and other related emergency assistance) is provided to income eligible households through various funding sources, primarily for those who have been impacted through COVID-19.

<u>Build-Up Academy</u> teaches young adults construction skills and connects them to apprenticeships, jobs and advanced training programs. Employment training and hands-on work are included. An industry recognized credential is awarded to graduates.

Utilizing best practices, <u>JOBS NOW!</u> is a highly individualized program designed to provide residents with the skills and support they need to meet goals they choose. Typical goals include finding a job, finding a better job, finishing a degree or completing a certification program.

<u>"Getting Ahead in a Just Gettin' By World"</u> focuses on mental models that participants in poverty develop that lead to their success through an individualized Plan for Prosperity. Getting Ahead is based on the Bridges Out of Poverty work of Dr. Ruby Payne. Most of the participants in the JOBS NOW! and Getting Ahead programs are single women with related children.

Through its <u>Individual Development Account</u> program, SELF helps clients learn how to save and plan for their futures. The IDA program provides matched savings which are released when goals are reached, and financial literacy and other instruction are complete. IDA clients can save for a first <u>home</u> purchase, post-secondary education, or business startup.

The <u>Butler County Microenterprise and Microloan Program</u>, a partnership with Neighborhood Housing Services of Hamilton, provides intensive training in starting a business to begin a life of self-employment. Clients complete their coursework with a rigorously crafted business plan and budget which they are ready to present to a loan committee.

SELF helps low-income residents with <u>transportation</u> on a limited basis. Active program participants are eligible for emergency or temporary job or job training transportation. Additionally, SELF is an active part of the Transit Alliance of Butler County which addresses the widespread and difficult problem of transportation especially for low-to-moderate income families. In addition, car repairs help residents who need their vehicle for employment purposes.

As part of SELF's Neighbors Who Care: Home Repair Program, home repairs are provided for owner-

occupied homeowners who lack the financial and physical means to complete the repairs themselves. SELF's approach is to organize local and national volunteer groups, under proper supervision, to complete/perform the repairs.

Throughout its history, SELF has helped thousands of low-income residents lift themselves out of poverty. SELF is committed to providing quality, best practice programming for its community, working in collaboration with other agencies, local governments and private volunteers. This work will re-affirm SELF's mission "to enhance the quality of life for county residents by impacting the causes of poverty and empowering individuals to achieve, sustain and advocate self-sufficiency."
